- A man called <u>John Priestley</u> went from being homeless to becoming a key player at Manchester's National Football Museum, in his own words going 'from zero to hero'.
- <u>Stephenson's Rocket</u> came home to its birthplace in Newcastle for the first time, it is currently on display at Discovery Museum
- <u>Salmon</u> are set to return to rivers in Leeds and Sheffield while <u>water voles</u> have been successfully reintroduced in Kielder Forest in Northumberland

- The history of astronomy will be in reach with a new discovery centre at <u>Jodrell Bank</u> in Cheshire
- <u>Hull</u> celebrated a successful year as City of Culture, backed by £3m of National Lottery funding.
