Celebrating Italian culture in Wales

They've just put their latest historic object in place - an Italian café coffee machine that belonged to the Rabaiotti family, which was used by brothers Luigi, Giuseppe and Ronaldo Rabaiotti until the 1950s.

We've caught up with Sioned Hughes, Keeper of History and Archaeology, to find out why this artefact is so important in the history of South Wales: "Italian cafes such as Rabaiotti's were common in every town in South Wales. They were warm, friendly places where friends chatted and drank milkshake, couples courted over coffee, and families came for drinks and ice cream."

Many Italians immigrated to South Wales and the UK in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries and set up cafés, restaurants and ice cream shops. Doing so, they brought a new eating style to the country.

It's hard now to imagine a time before we could grab a coffee or go out for food in the evening - but this is a relatively new phenomenon and much of it started in the 1950s with Italian families like those in the South Wales valleys sharing their passion for food and drink.
