Devon's Coldharbour Mill is offering half-price entry

Manchester institution **Band on the Wall** re-opens in March and will offer 20% off all events.

- **SS Great Britain** in Bristol, the world's first great ocean liner, will have over 1,000 free tickets available for National Lottery players to book online.
- Devon's **Coldharbour Mill**, one of the oldest woollen textile mills in the world, will be offering half price entry.
- Crich Tramway Village in Derbyshire, home of the National Tramway Museum, will offer two-forone day entry from 21-23 March.
- St Nicholas Priory, Exeter's oldest building, will offer a free guidebook as part of a visit.
- **The National Trust** will be opening up over 140 sites with free entry, including; Powis Castle in Wales, built around 1200 as a medieval fortress; Seaton Delaval Hall, Northumberland, one of the finest houses in the North East; and Knole in Kent, originally built as an archbishop's palace, with a parkland still populated by wild deer.
