- Meet the volunteers and young people working on projects to secure an even brighter future for the William Morris Gallery and Lloyd Park
- Gain an insight into the wonderful natural and industrial heritage of <u>Walthamstow Wetlands</u> where work has begun to transform it into the largest urban wetland nature reserve in London
- Hail a black cab to Peckham's cabbie shelter, one of the city's 13 huts which have provided cab drivers with a place to eat and rest for over 130 years. Often overlooked, their story is now the focus of a lovely heritage project.
