Visitors to Yorkshire this summer will be delighted to know that the award-winning Burnby Hall Gardens and Museum in Pocklington are undergoing a major restoration project, thanks to National Lottery players.

Burnby Hall Gardens are unique, with the national collection of hardy water lilies (Nymphaea) being described as the best in a natural setting in Europe. Around 50,000 visitors a year come to explore this fantastic landscape, and this project, supported by a grant of £634,000, will help ensure that the legacy of Major Percy Marlborough Stewart and his wife Katharine remains a reality for future generations.

The essence of project is to renovate the lakes, revitalise the hardy water lilies and ornamental fish within them, restore the 1920's rock garden to its original appearance, re-develop an Edwardian Potting shed on the site as a visitor feature, and create a bespoke learning zone for educational groups.
