

Henry I hunting forest brought back to life

A number of new activities will be on offer at Hainault Ancient Forest LB of Redbridge National Lottery support of £4.5million will ensure that Hainault Ancient Forest in Redbridge can look forward to a brighter future.

Covering a total of 800 acres, the forest includes 250 acres of greenbelt, ancient woodland, Foxburrows Children's Farm and a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). It is the last fragment of a medieval royal hunting forest established by Henry I and includes Hatfield and Epping.
